Comments Good Evening, I am a member of the Escondido Community Advisory on Environmental Issues and Climate Action. Our group has conducted a substantial amount of research to identify the best climate action plans, to create a diverse set of recommendations for the ECAP, so that we can achieve the GHG reduction goals that are required of the jurisdiction. This year than ever before, we have experienced first hand the cataclysmic potential climate change has. I live in a high fire risk area, and I am scared every time there is a santa ana winds or the temperature goes over 80 that a fire is going to start, taking away everything from my family and I. I have family members in Puerto Cabezas, Nicaragua where a few months ago two Category 5 hurricanes descended upon them in the span of 13 days, in the midst of a pandemic. This is Climate Change and we must do more than the bare minimum. The reality of the climate situation is if business as usual continues, what we have experienced in the past year is the best that can be expected, it's just going to keep getting worse. The draft ECAP that has just been presented to you is deficient on GHG emissions. This is unacceptable. It is vital that this council meets climate change where it is: with urgency, and our policy should reflect it. We must above all have an ECAP that at least meets what the state requires. I am happy to see a Zero Waste Plan Included as part of the recommendations, but those goals will not be met unless we include plastics reduction language, prioritize city outreach on waste reduction to priority investment neighborhoods and local businesses, and partner with the school district to create a zero waste program. These need to be added into the Solid Waste management section of the ECAP. Plastic is toxic from inception to disposal. Black and Brown communities are disproportionately located near oil refineries that emit toxic chemical cocktails. There is no throw away, our waste ends up in the global south where waste sorters sort through filth to find salvageable material, it is inhumane. We are knowingly complicit in this system that is causing a great environmental injustice if we don't include plastics reduction as part of the ECAP. I also urge the council to direct city staff to move the zero waste plan timeline to 90% by 2030. Escondido has been behind and now we are playing catch up! Also wanted to thank the city staff and acknowledge their hard work on the ECAP. Also thank you to all the community members, and non-profit orgs who have been vital in guiding us through this process.

Comments Dear Mayor and City Council, I hope you have had a chance to review our Escondido Community Advisory Group for Environmental and Climate Action (ECAG) comment letter. It represents 100's of hours of work on the part of local community members since last February. The ECAG did an amazing amount of research, analysis, and crafted reasonable recommendations through, conservatively, over 30 subcommittee and four full ECAG meetings during that time. We're sorry we were not afforded a chance to present to the Council. Please know that the recommendations in the letter were inclusive of and unanimously supported by the members who have been active in the ECAG. We request that you adopt the ECAG recommendations which will address equity for residents most in need, reduce dangerous greenhouse gas emissions, increase sequestration and ecological health, improve quality of life, and represent 'gold-standard' climate action plan. As for the ghg reduction deficit of the draft plan, the ECAG letter outlines two options for filling that gap. If the gap remains, the environmental documentation will be rendered invalid and the General Plan could be undermined. I strongly urge the Council to add reductions in excess of the minimum required to both make good your commitment to effective climate action and to have a buffer in case other actions are not completed. The climate crisis is the unfolding catastrophe of our age and the future. Please do not shrink from your duty or try to minimize the need for action. It is not too late to take action as long as it is quick, effective, and significant. Now is not the time for incrementalism. The future, truly, is in your hands.

For over a year, I have been a part of the Escondido Advisory Group, and our group worked on The Solid Waste Management; part of our recommendations were to add some language for Plastic Reduction, prioritize city outreach to businesses and residents on waste reduction, and partner with the school district to create a Zero Waste Program. The current draft doesn't include include our recommendations nor does it achieve the green house gases emissions that are recommended by our jurisdiction. Yesterday, I attended The 8th Annual Zero Waste Symposium that the City of San Diego offers, but this year was virtual because of the ongoing pandemic. Bob Hill from EDCO gave a presentation on The Waste Digester Facility in Escondido, and I believe that Laura Robinson, who is in charge of the City's recycling programs was also present. This symposium offered much needed information regarding waste, and recycling; it also provided options, gave ideas and solutions to deal with our huge waste problem. One of the speakers said, "What we do, and what we consume has a bigger impact than even Transportation." We cannot have have a Zero Waste Plan that doesn't include "Reducing Single Use Plastics." Thank you Council members and Staff for your time; please consider reviewing my comments, and consider adding them back in to the ECAP.

Comments Hello council members, I believe Escondido's Climate Action Plan update is not yet ready for finalization. As it stands right now, the ECAP will not reduce GHG levels to those mandated by the state. This is not only unambitious, but fails to comply with legal mandates. The city needs to make a legally binding commitment to become zero carbon as soon as possible, and at the latest, by 2045. California Executive Order B-55-18 aims to achieve state carbon neutrality by 2045. In order to work cooperatively with the state to achieve climate goals and do our part in averting the climate crisis, we must commit to binding goals as ambitious or more ambitious than those set by the state. We must commit to Community Choice Energy to achieve 100% clean energy by 2030. Single family homes constitute an important part of the natural gas combustion for energy. Our stoves, and our hot water in most homes are powered by combusting planet warming gases. In order to reach zero carbon, existing single family houses in addition to multi-family developments and new construction must all be fully electrified and use efficient appliances including air conditioning. The city needs to make binding commitments to reducing plastic waste and single use materials and products in order to reach state zero waste goals. Plastic is an exponentially worsening problem globally, and there are massive patches of garbage floating in every ocean on Earth, including 2 in the pacific, one of which lies between California and Hawaii. The city must commit to more ambitious targets for usage and availability of public mass transit, cycling, and pedestrian routes. Escondido needs to commit to increasing sustainably built and well maintained affordable housing, especially near transit stations. Finally, the city must continue to center environmental justice in this work. There is a tremendous need for improving the health, housing, wellbeing, and economic security of Escondido's residents. We can achieve this through our climate action plan and other legislation. My comment was largely inspired by Climate Action Campaign's February 9th letter to the mayor and council. I agree with all the items described in this letter and ask you to adopt all of them. Let's make a better future, together. Thank you.

Comments As a member of the ECAG and a resident of Escondido, I urge you all to please adopting the following measures into the ECAP as robust climate action planning - emissions mitigation and adaptation TODAY is of the utmost importance to ensure the long term health, safety, and socio-economic footing for our city's residents. Please consider the following key initiatives: 1) Inclusion of a Zero-Waste policy in the ECAP. Specifically, developing a Zero Waste Plan that includes single-use plastic reduction measures in order to meet waste diversion goals. 2) Commit to implementation of Community Choice Energy, and date by which the city will join a CC aggregate. 3) Adopt an Adaptation Measure to develop a Green Infrastructure Plan to maximize parks, open space, natural water quality improvements, green rights-of-way, trails, riparian restoration areas to ensure connected and accessible green space throughout the city." 4) Recommend the following be restored & strengthened in Measure A-2.3: Build capacity of adaptive neighborhoods: "Avoid the siting of new land-use densities (i.e. density increases and annexations) in 'Very High Fire Hazard' areas. Development in native wildlands & chaparral ecosystems significantly decreases carbon sequestration, threatens critical wildlife, expands vehicle miles traveled, and poses significant fire risk to humans and property." 5) Bring ECAP in closer alignment with Executive Order N-79-20 setting a goal related to purchase of electric vehicles by setting a goal of 60% conversion of the fleet by 2030 and complete conversion of the municipal fleet by 2035. 6) The City Council should address the deficiency created by Measure T-2.3 from the draft plan. These actions were planned for 9,032 MTCO_{2e} of reductions. This was a significant reduction and was not replaced with other reductions. The Council should restore the original recommendation and the reductions to align with the CEQA documents. 7) Establish a Climate Commission to oversee implementation, adherence, and future interaction and support with community members!!!

Measure T-2.3: Increase Renewable or Alternative Fuel Construction Equipment.		
Adopt an ordinance, effective in 2023, requiring new developments and significant land-moving and construction projects to use electric-powered or alternatively-fueled construction equipment.		
Target Year	Performance Metric	GHG Reduction Potential (MTCO _{2e})
2022	Adopt an ordinance requiring electric-powered or alternatively-fueled construction equipment in all new developments and land-moving projects, to the extent such equipment is available.	-
2030	Reduce fuel consumed by construction equipment and construction fleets by 30 percent by 2030.	5,321
2035	Reduce fuel consumed by construction equipment and construction fleets by 50 percent by 2035.	9,032

Supporting Actions:

- Conduct educational campaigns to promote fuel-efficient driving (“eco-driving”) practices, such as reduced idling, slower driving speeds, gentle acceleration, and proper tire inflation.
- Update the City’s General Plan Mobility and Infrastructure Element to support network build-out and improved traffic flow.
- Medium- and heavy-duty truck sales and usage is expected to increase starting in 2024, consistent with the 2020 Advanced Clean Truck Rule mandated by the California Air Resource Board (“CARB”). To support this rule, the City should adopt an ordinance to establish requirements for large truck EV charging stations and work with businesses to increase station access to support the mandate.




Figure 1 Breakdown of GHG Emissions in Escondido (2012)



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

- ▶ Escondido is close to 10%




Construction & Mining GHG Impact

- ▶ Logical link used:
 - Location of the “job” is the Location of the GHG emissions
 - If Escondido has 10% of the jobs, Escondido must have 10% of the emissions
- ▶ I believe this logic is flawed
 - GHG emissions from construction equipment take place at construction sites not at the location of a company

Construction & Mining GHG Impact

- ▶ This data was provided by SANDAG and used by EPIC to craft other Climate Action Plans in San Diego County
 - ▶ How did these other jurisdictions address Construction & Mining emissions?
 - ▶ For insight, I looked at the other North County Cities, San Diego, and the County

Construction & Mining GHG Impact

- ▶ The City of San Diego, with 32% of Construction jobs, makes no mention of Construction & Mining Emissions
 - ▶ The County of San Diego, with 17% of Construction jobs, does include the topic in their CAP, but takes no action
 - ▶ Vista is the only North County City taking action by proposing a 30% reduction in their 4% “jobs” allocation



- ▶ Implementing a reduction plan based on this would result in a false sense of accomplishment
 - (Reported reduction would exceed the actual reduction)
- ▶ Requiring Construction activities in Escondido to comply with measure-2.3 would create an unwarranted burden, and put Escondido at an economic disadvantage
